Readings:

- Each day is a step we take towards eternity and we shall continue to step from day to day until we take the last step, which will bring us into the presence of God; let us always walk before God in anticipation of that day. (Catherine McAuley)
- By early November 1841 Catherine became bedridden and on the 8th she received the last sacraments. Visits from family and community members filled her last days. For each she had a personal word and a blessing. Although she had completed her formal will before leaving for Birmingham (in September), she now told her sisters who kept vigil at her bedside that her legacy to the institute was charity ... Concern for the fatigue of the sisters gathered around her led to her now cherished wish that they should "have a good cup of tea when I am gone." Catherine died in the evening of November 11 and according to her wishes was laid in the ground like the poor. The deep sorrow of family, friends and community members is perhaps most simply and poignantly expressed by Sister Theresa White: "I feel sad to have outlived her." (Sheila Carney, rsm)
